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Not-For-Profit Sector News

As I write this I am looking out over our extensive and well appointed new offices at Level 5, 182 Victoria Square (on the corner of Victoria Square and Flinders St) – the offices that once housed the Reserve Bank. I would personally like to thank the Premier and the SA State Government for their generous support and extend an open invitation to all organisations and volunteers to visit our new offices and see the improved facilities and services now available.

News from the Federal Government's Not-For-Profit Sector Reform Council.

As a member of the Reform Council, I attended the second full Council meeting held in Canberra on Wednesday 18 May 2011.

What's been achieved in the past six months?

- The Office of the Not-For-Profit Sector and the Not-For-Profit Reform Council have both been established.
- In the 2011/12 budget, the Federal Government announced \$53.6 million over 4 years to establish an independent Commonwealth Regulator.
- New National Regulator, the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) will be in place by 1 July 2012. The ACNC will be responsible for determining applications for charitable, public benevolent institutions, and other not for profit status for all Commonwealth purposes. It will also implement a reporting framework for the sector, provide education and support on technical matters, and establish a public information portal by 1 July 2013.
 - ACNC Interim Commissioner, Susan Pascoe AM has been appointed and will report to Parliament through the Assistant Treasurer. The Commissioner will lead an Implementation Taskforce which has been established in Treasury from 1 July 2011 to consult further with the public, the not for profit sector and government agencies, and to have the ACNC ready for operation by 1 July 2012. The taskforce will also commence

development of the new reporting framework and public information portal.

- The Chair of the advisory board assisting the ACNC, Mr Robert Fitzgerald AM, has been appointed
- \$2.9 million over four years has been allocated to introduce a statutory definition of 'charity' for the purpose of all Commonwealth laws from 1 July 2013. Negotiations with states and territories on national regulation and a single national definition of 'charity' are being progressed through the Council of Australian Governments (COAG) as these measures will be of most value if they are adopted nationally.
- Through COAG, governments are already working on greater consistency and harmonisation.
- Red tape reduction includes reforms on contract provisions (procurement and grants), greater consistency between all government departments, simplified funding agreement templates for low risk grants and streamlined reporting. The Federal Government is currently piloting streamlined contracting arrangements and are looking to develop and pilot a new Common Funding Agreement by mid 2012.
- Commonwealth Government departments have appointed a Deputy Secretary as advocate with responsibility for supporting their agency's contribution to, and adoption of new processes to reduce red tape, streamline reporting requirements and implement priority actions under the National Compact: working together. The Council strongly supported this decision, as it will provide a strong accountability mechanism for the National Compact and the Government's reform agenda.
- Later this year the Federal Government will be launching the National Volunteering Strategy. The Strategy will set out the Government's vision for volunteering, including supporting those who are currently volunteers and encouraging more Australians to participate in volunteering.

• Kate Smith received the Joy Noble Medal for her outstanding efforts as a volunteer with Disability SA and an advocate for its residents.

- CMI Toyota received the Premier's Business Award in Volunteering for their support of Adelaide Conservation Volunteers since 2003, particularly with environmental initiatives.
- The International Women's Group at Modbury Uniting Church received the Andamooka Community Project Award for providing a safe environment in which women refugees and migrants from different backgrounds can learn and practice new skills aimed at assisting them to settle and feel welcome in Australia.

Guests at the Volunteers' Day Concert each received a copy of the 2011 Volunteer Bonus Book, offering discounts and special offers.

A total of 10,000 copies of the Bonus Book are being distributed through many of the local Volunteer Resource Centres, so I do hope that you pick up a copy and treat yourself to the range of special offers in the booklet. Thanks for the work you do to make South Australia a better place to live.

I also took the opportunity at the Volunteers' Day Concert to launch my report for 2011. The report highlights achievements and initiatives in the South Australian community over the past 12 months taken to support volunteers and volunteering organisations.

Refereeing of Papers: Proposals are also invited for refereed conference papers which are designed to allow the presentation of completed research projects. The conference proceedings will be widely available. One of the more experienced volunteers – Rosie McPhail came up with the idea of using a hand symbol to represent support, guidance and helping others. From this idea other volunteers also added to it and they brain stormed and visualised what they would like the art work to look like.

One of our husband and wife volunteer teams Carmel and Brian Perry happened to have a couple staying with them who are currently backpacking around Australia – Alvin and Stella. Alvin is a graphic design artist so he keenly put together the ideas that the volunteers had come up with and produced the following 2 pieces of art work. The nice part about this is Alvin "volunteered" to help our volunteers!

The first art piece is titled "*The Spirit of Volunteering*" this illustrates the volunteer's involvement in supporting an individual and watching them grow and develop despite the difficulties and challenges that they have experienced in their lives. The heart symbol represents volunteer's commitment and caring attitude towards the children and young people.

The 'many hands' represent the many people that may be involved in raising a young person (it takes a village to raise a child) and also the fact that many hands make light work- the volunteer program could always benefit from having more caring people involved.

The second art piece is titled "*Hearts, Minds and Hands*" These 3 elements together are what it takes to be a Families SA volunteer.

The many "Hands" that are reaching up to support the children in need, and the physical side of the involvement as a volunteer ie –spending many hours driving and transporting children to school, access and appointments.

"Hearts" represent the emotional side of volunteering for

Families SA, the clients we work with are not always easy or thankful for a volunteers involvement but at the end of the day a volunteer goes home knowing that they have helped someone in need.

"*Minds*" represents the mature approach needed by the volunteers who work with our young people and the fact that they need to understand the emotional state of a young person and think before they respond to a young person who may be acting inappropriately or may be in crisis.

It also represents the team work involved when working with a young person –this may mean that a volunteer is part of the larger picture for a client – others involved maybe the social worker, supervisor, relative or foster carers, school teachers, biological family and many others.

The Royal Agricultural & Horticultural Society of SA Inc is an institution born in 1839 and this year celebrates 236 Shows over a period of 172 years. The Royal Show is the longest running and largest event on the South Australian calendar, it's a State icon and a community event entertaining and educating more than half a million people annually.

The Show has been supported and delivered through the assistance of volunteer Judges and Stewards for many years and currently depends on approximately 650 of them to assist in offering professional and first-hand advice in their specialised field to Show patrons as well as judging competitive sections.

Gwenda Baker has served as a judge and steward in the Handicrafts section for almost 50 years, Decima MacDonald has been judging Spinning & Weaving, Lace & Embroidery for 40 years and Kaye Naughton has been a judge in Junior Art, Craft & Design for 37 years. Steven Kohler was a steward in the pig section for 28 years. Most of these volunteers have been recipients of the Long Service Volunteer Award, their years of tireless volunteering and supporting the Show has been unwavering.

In addition to our Judges and Stewards, the Show relies on the assistance of many group volunteers and although the Society makes a donation to the various organisations involved, the individual members are volunteers as they do not receive any personal financial benefit.

Various Scout groups assist with running the stamping stations on the Farm Walk, and when we are all tucked up in our beds, spare a thought for the Scouts who muck out the Sheep Pavilion each night of the Show.

Urrbrae College students run the Pigs and People section which is part of their curriculum and the Learning Centre is managed by DECS who source volunteers from secondary schools and our Information Booths are coordinated and managed by Stirling Rotary.

With the diverse field of Show volunteers and the introduction of the National Standards for Involving Volunteers in notfor-profit organisations, it is time to introduce a Volunteer Program and we are extremely excited to be engaging the broader community to be part of this iconic event.

Almost 30% of the State's population attends the Show each

year with generations having enjoyed the Show's offerings and continuing to do so. In 2010 the Show received its second

largest number of competitive entries in its 235 Shows history, 30,087 entries only 12 entries short of an all time record were received. The Historic Beginnings of Toc H

A Brief history of the Toc H Movement

The origins of the Toc H Movement are linked to the town of Poperinge in southern Belgium in World War I. It was in this town in December 1915 that the British Army Chaplains' Department set up, what was essentially, a rest and recreation centre for British and allied soldiers on leave from the front lines in the Ypres Salient in the heart of Flanders Fields. The centre was named 'Talbot House' in memory of a young British officer, Gilbert Talbot, who had been killed in action earlier that same year.

Talbot House operated under the charge of Australian born British Army Chaplain Rev. Philip 'Tubby' Clayton. During the 3 years of its operation, until the end of the war, it is estimated that some 500,000 soldiers visited the centre to enjoy the facilities it offered. Initially the soldiers referred to Talbot House as 'T H' and later as 'Toc H'. The Army signaller's code, at that time, for the letter 'T' was the word 'Toc'.

The Toc H Movement was established in Britain in 1922 by Royal Charter, following a desire by many British returned servicemento uphold the 'Spirit of Talbot House' as a peacetime

movement. Tubby Clayton was drafted as the founding padre and Toc H soon spread to the other allied nations who had fought in the Ypres Salient.

The iconic Talbot House in

Poperinge remains today as a living museum and thousands of people from around the world visit and stay there each year while touring the battlefields of Flanders Fields.

75th Anniversary of the Toc H Victor Harbor Branch

The Toc H Movement was

established in Australia in 1925 when Tubby Clayton made his first return visit to the country of his birth. It has been active as a community service organisation ever since, no more so than in Victor Harbor. The Victor Harbor Branch is the oldest continuous branch or group in South Australia, having been set up in August 1935, and the second oldest in Australia.

The Toc H Campsite on Waggon Road, has served the South Australian community for some three generations, since 1938, but this would not have been possible without the wonderful support of the local Toc H members throughout these years. The branch has long been committed to the local community through its service activities and links with other community organisations – Rotary, Lions, the Arthritis Association and the RSL – to name a few.

The Main Hall at the Victor Harbor campsite

Toc H Victor Harbor Branch holds a special place in the history of Toc H South Australia. The early activities of the branch

and the development of the campsite were supported by Sir Winston Dugan (later Lord Dugan), the Governor of South Australia in the mid to late 1930s. Ever since this time the Patron of Toc H in South Australia has been the Governor of the State. The present Governor, His Excellency Kevin Scarce also shares an interest in the work of the Toc H Movement and its activities in Victor Harbor.

The executive of Toc H Australia Southern Region, of which Toc H South Australia is a major part, was extremely proud that The City of Victor Harbor chose to honour the Toc H Victor Harbor Branch with a Civic Reception to recognise its 75th anniversary.

This event was celebrated during the evening of Friday, 17th September, 2010 at the Victor Harbor Civic Centre with invited guests from Toc H and the local community. There was also a strong Local Government involvement, including the Mayor and Deputy Mayor of the City of Victor Harbor.

On Sunday, 31st October 2010, the Toc H Victor Harbor Branch ran a Gala Day at the campsite on Waggon Road from 12:00 noon to 4:30 p.m. This event, the second part of the 75th



anniversary celebrations, was organised as an open invitation to everyone in the district to visit the campsite and inspect the facilities and join in the fun.

This was a great occasion, and despite a threatening weather forecast (which did not eventuate) we were able to offer a warm Toc H welcome to our Patron, the Governor, His Excellency Rear Admiral Kevin Scarce and Mrs Scarce, in sunny but cool

conditions, to formally open the event. (See photo, left)

Toc H Camping Program -

Many thousands of disadvantaged primary school aged children have been able to have a holiday by the seaside as a result of the Toc H Camping Program. This program is kindly supported by various Kiwanis and Rotary Clubs, and Toc H branches, and is aimed at offering respite for children in need for between 3 and 5 days duration.

The camps are held during the summer and winter holidays, and another camp is organised annually for refugee children recently arrived in Adelaide. The first two camps for refugees have been generously supported by the Morialta Trust.

These camps wouldn't be possible without the many hours of dedicated involvement by young trained volunteer leaders who, together with the two Toc H Directors of Camping, plan the activities and care for the children.

Susan J Ellis Challenges The Volunteer Sector

On Thursday 2 June 2011, Volunteering SA&NT, in partnership with Northern Volunteering SA, Southern Volunteering SA, and Limestone Coast Volunteer Resource Centre introduced Susan J. Ellis, President of Energize Inc to individuals from the Volunteering Sector in South Australia. Seventy two people attended the workshop titled *"Educate Up: Gaining True Support for Volunteers from Top Management,"* held at the BioSA Incubator Conference Centre, West Thebarton.

OzVMP and People First Total Solution were instrumental in bringing Susan to Adelaide and organising her Australian tour. Susan J. Ellis is President of Energize Inc., an international training, consulting and publishing firm that specializes in volunteerism. She founded the Philadephia-based company in 1977 and since that time has assisted clients throughout North America, Europe, Asia, Latin America, Israel and Australasia to create or strengthen their volunteer corps. Energize's innovative website www.energize.com has won international recognition as a premier resource for volunteer program leaders.

Throughout the full day session, Susan challenged the participants to think outside the square and confront issues that are regularly pushed to one side in the volunteering sector.

The key learning areas were how to:

- Assess the level of genuine support given by the organisations to volunteers
- Identify what needs to change at the senior management level to permit more effective engagement of volunteers
- Effectively confront resistance or obstacles to maximum volunteer participation
- Become the in-house educator on volunteerism and be pre-active in surprising ways
- Transform volunteer recognition events and enlist volunteers in advocacy for what they need

Home Visiting Volunteer Program For Young Families

A team of volunteers is working guietly in the communities of Jamestown, Booleroo and Orroroo and surrounding towns help young families cope. It's all part of the Together Building Families Home Visiting Program, for families with children aged 0-5 and pregnant mothers.

The volunteers offer practical support for the parent at home,

looking after the child or children so the parent can attend to other duties, be that housework, school commitments with an older child, shopping, attend to phone calls, or any number of other duties.

The program is about keeping mums well, and in doing so, fostering the mental health of the whole family.

It offers practical and emotional support – feeding the baby, settling them, reading to them. It's not about doing house work, but maintaining

wellness and offering support to anyone who may not have the family support available, whether that is because their families are not living locally or are busy working.

Families can self refer into the program by contacting the Rural Health Team, while referrals can also come from friends, midwives, CAFHS nurses, and child health services.

The service is offered for six weeks to up to three months, depending on needs. Commonwealth funding ensures the services is provided free to families and also reimburses volunteers for all travel expenses relating to their volunteer work. It's a confidential program and volunteers undergo a four day training programme in which they are given an understanding of child injury prevention, confidentiality, cultural awareness, child safe environments (mandatory reporting).

She says it's a wonderful experience. "It is wonderful to see the children warm to you, to build the trust and rapport with the young child. It's great for the mums, they can go off for a few hours and do whatever they need to do," Mrs Clarke said. The mums are very grateful, you can see the mums relax and grown within themselves, they really appreciate the space for

themselves."

Mrs Clarke also attends the local playgroup twice a week to offer support to mums with several children. "It's in my nature to love children and to be with families."

"We also give the volunteers a fun kit with playdough, stickers,

books, or toys from the toy library, so they have something

special to share with the young people they are looking after."

Avis Clark, affectionately known as the "Melrose Grandma",

has been volunteering her services time to families in the area

informally for many years and became part of the Rural Health

Knowing Myself As A Mentor

He wrote:

"How are you going? I am still waiting for my new mentor and was wondering if you are able to visit me again soon. I enjoyed working with you and playing cricket I think that working with you helped me concentrate on my learning and behaviour. In class we are learning about natural disasters and writing narratives.

I hope to see you soon."

When I commenced in my role as a volunteer community mentor, it was not easy. I was matched with 2 children who were totally different from one another. One child was, in a sense, over accommodating and welcoming and ensured that we were kept busy with pre-planned activities that were 'outside the square' and in contrast, the other child was extremely reserved and reluctant to reveal what might make him smile with happiness, what might make his heart soar.

Although both children are exceptional in their unique ways, I wish to tell you about the child who was introverted and yet deeply thoughtful, more difficult to connect with and yet filled with incredible potential underneath the protective layers built up

over time. To give you some insight into our interactions, it took months of meeting with him at school for an hour a week to make eye contact. I felt frustrated; I questioned if our time together was of any benefit and more than once I thought about giving up. Yet each week I turned up and so did he - and for that week - turning up was enough.

In my heart I felt that he needed my help and I could not give up. After our mentoring sessions I would sit quietly at home and reflect on our shared time, I could not shake the feeling that I needed go beyond the constructed protective shell. I pondered his perspective of the world, the differences between us: the 30 years in age between us, our differing family backgrounds, the fact that I am from a vastly different culture and country. Yet again and again, I came back to our shared humanity. I sought ways to 'walk in his shoes' and



become increasingly attuned to experiencing his view of the world.

For me, reflecting on our time together and focusing on finding ways to close the gap between us was of utmost importance in the development of our mentoring relationship. I sought practical ways to connect with him: intentionally using his words during our mentoring conversations, picking up small

> pieces of information on his likes and dislikes and using these as the basis for our activities, and learning more about his family background.

> Week by week, hour by hour I saw small changes as little by little he opened his world up to me. He started to make eye contact with me, he even began to smile and laugh as we journeyed together and started to feel a sense of shared experiences and trust in one another. What a privilege to be let into his world, what a great honour to receive his warmth and appreciation. To receive a compliment from a being that you have mentored is priceless. It

is magical to connect with a young person and experience the joy of reparative connection with the next generation.

From this experience, I feel that volunteer mentoring is a fundamental duty towards society and future generations. Who can measure the impact of creating a positive relationship with a young person whose heart has closed due to modern social pressures? However to get these results I have had to plough through uncomfortable moments for which there were no answers except to keep going. If I can bring meaningful connection into a young person's life with observable and measurable results, this is definitely something that I want to share with other school volunteer mentors.

National Summit Provides A Wealth Of Information

In May I attended the 2011 National Emergency Management Volunteers Summit in Canberra that provided a wealth of information and experiences to draw on. Over 500 people from all corners of Australia and variety of emergency volunteer organisations were represented.

Stuart Diver gave an inspirational talk about his experience of surviving the Threadbo landslide in '97 and his life's challenges since then. It is an amazing story of overcoming adversity and I highly recommend that you take any opportunity to hear him speak.

There were plenty of discussions and ideas around recruitment and retention of young and culturally diverse emergency volunteers, as it appears that like many sectors, these are two areas that are not proportionally represented in the emergency volunteering force.

It was of particular interest to learn about how other states are coordinating their emergency response and recovery and the different approaches to all agencies working together. This varied from attempting to encompass all possible agencies to non-existent formal and informal arrangements.

The bringing together of emergency response and recovery groups explores how we will all manage volunteers at all

stages of an emergency. There are great opportunities to not only improve our systems but we can also solve some of our recruitment challenges at the same time.

The summit highlighted the need for many organisations to look at their investment in volunteer management.

Looking through the lens of volunteer management as a part of supporting volunteers I could see some real opportunities for organisations to avoid reinventing the wheel by tapping into the volunteer management support offered by their state and territory peak bodies and Volunteer Resource Centres

Other highlights for me included talks from Anna Newton-Walters a young volunteer from the ACT State Emergency services, who wowed the room with her energy and irreverence towards stereotypes of young and older volunteers.

Adam Dent from Red Cross Victoria State Emergency Services followed Anna's talk with an equally powerful overview of working in the recovery space following the Victorian Bush fires. In particular Adam's intense respect for his volunteers and the people they are helping was a great reminder of the privilege it is for us to work with volunteers and the community they serve.

Objectives of the Summit:

- · identify and discuss contemporary issues within the emergency management volunteer sector
- showcase and discuss best practice in the emergency management volunteer sector
- develop recommendations of significance to the emergency management volunteer sector
- commit to working together to progress recommendations to further enhance emergency management capability and community resilience in Australia, and
- connect government at all levels, non-government organisations and emergency management volunteers from across Australia.

Star Bear Volunteers Needed To Support Grieving Kids

Anglicare SA's Star Bear program has been providing grieving children aged 5 to 17 years with a shoulder to lean on since 1999 and is looking to recruit more mentors and volunteers for its weekend camps.

Helping almost a thousand children and their families and run by trained mentors and carers from Friday to Sunday, Star Bear camps are designed to increase children's understanding of death and the grieving process and give them an opportunity to share their experiences with others.

Joan Watson is a 70 years young volunteer who has been involved in Star Bear camps for three years. She says getting involved is worthwhile for anyone wanting to help children who struggle to express their grief.

"My main role is to help out in the kitchen and also coordinate and assist in designing memory boxes with the children," she said. "The memory boxes are used by the children to place memorabilia of the person they have lost inside them.

"Often children find when involved in the camp that they are not the only one going through the grief and they can share their experiences with others."

"Being able to help and support these children is fulfilling and the fact that I have potentially helped someone is rewarding." Volunteer, Joan Watson.

Training is provided to all new mentors and volunteers, with no counselling qualifications required.

In November 2010, a group of VSA&NT interviewers participated in a highly successful visit to a series of three Multicultural organisations – Greek Welfare, P.I.S.A. – Italian Meals Delivery Service and Chinese Welfare. The interviewers commented on their increased knowledge and this correlated with an increase in potential volunteers being directed to Multicultural organisations for placements. All of this has resulted in a second visit being organised.

Myself and two of our dedicated interviewers, Laine Turner and Stephen Moller were met by Lan Nguyen, Welfare Director at the Vietnamese Community in their grounds in May.

A delightful visit was underscored by a powerful presentation designed by Lan on Vietnamese culture and her own story as a young 21 year old refugee who arrived in Australia by boat to escape persecution. This opened all our eyes.

The Cambodian Aged Care Service was our next port of call. There were flags flying everywhere, a result of a recent celebration. The smell of fresh coriander and chilli wafted in as we entered the room where the elderly Cambodians were having lunch! and we were invited to join them for fish cakes, sweet chilli sauce, battered prawns, delicious soup with prawn balls and bok choy followed by sumptuous coconut dusted desserts made for an incredible meal! We were really spoilt.

Nhey Hean and Sambath Yun, Program Coordinators, showed us through their facilities which included rooms for praying and offerings to Buddha, their offices and the main room for activities and eating.

Our final destination was A.N.F.E (Associazione Nazionale Famiglie degli Emigrati Inc.) where we were greeted on our arrival at Flinders Park Community Centre by Volunteer and Program Coordinator, Helen English.

The chatter of around 40 elderly Italians seemed to fill every corner. During the activity part of the daily Day Care Program managed by Gianni Maniero, a few looked our way, but most were engrossed in Bingo or the card game they were playing. Over a good strong Italian short black, the interviewers chatted with Gianni about his volunteer needs, centring on more drivers to drive the buses that pick up the elderly and kitchen assistants/cooks.

We were there to find out what these organisations need in terms of volunteers to sustain and expand their services to meet the increasing demand of the Multicultural Aged Care Sector.

We all left A.N.F.E. and the other organisations with full stomachs, valuable information and a knowledge of what they need to continue making a difference to our Multicultural elderly.

Support For Latvian Community

LAIMA was established in 2004 to provide much needed support for the Latvian elderly.

Seven years on, the organisation now provides a monthly lunch and activities for over 65 elderly Latvians, cooking classes where the volunteers teach the young traditional Latvian recipes (a Latvian cookbook is on it's way!), monthly outings for carers and uniquely Latvian outings for everyone such as mushrooming in Kuitpo Forest.

When members of the original Latvian community arrived in Adelaide in the late 1940s, their primary intention was to keep Latvian culture alive. To do this, they had to volunteer their time in order to maintain language and traditions.

"It was natural for them" says IIze Ostrovska, Volunteer Coordinator and Administrator of LAIMA. She goes onto say; "They maintain Latvian culture here. They built the current buildings which house the Association, the shop, school, church, relief society and the hall where Day Care is the community gave their money."

"Everything we do is culturally based"

says Valda Peddie, Program Manager.

"When the volunteers demonstrate traditional Latvian recipes in the Saturday cooking classes, the elderly bring their children and grandchildren," says Valda. "There is learning from generation to generation. To be involved in your own culture reinforces that side of your life. It becomes more important as

you get older."

For Ilze, working at LAIMA gives her the opportunity to connect with her homeland. Arriving in Australia in 1991, her work at LAIMA means she can speak in her own language and not least, "...make the lives of elderly Latvians rich."

"The greatest expression of this is the opportunity to listen to their stories. "Of course, they have told their friends their life story over and over, but I am fresh and they love telling them to me," said llze.

LAIMA provides eight events per month for clients, volunteers and carers. We salute the contribution you make!
